**Exchange Bank of Peoria Reopens Its Doors**

PHOENIX, Apr. 20.—With the reopening of the Exchange Bank of Peoria Wednesday morning, two of the four recently crippled banks of Maricopa county are back in the running within four weeks from the time they were forced to close their doors. The Citizens' State Bank of Phoenix reopened a week ago.

As in the case of the Citizens' bank, the Exchange bank is reopened on a cooperative plan entered into by the bank officials, the state bank examiners and the depositors. Under the agreement the depositors will leave what money they had in the bank at the time of closing, untouched for practically a year. It is announced that within a short time the reserve and capital stock will be increased appreciably.

The bank at Wickenburg is still in the hands of the receiver. A recent interview given out by an official of the defunct Central Bank of Phoenix, the largest one to collapse, it was stated that there is every indication that the bank will be reopened in the near future.

**MILLER AND COX ARE SUCCESSORS TO HUGO MILLER**

It will be gratifying to the mining men of this section to know that Mr. Hugo W. Miller has found it necessary to enlarge his business, by taking in as partner Mr. Chas. N. Cox.

Mr. Cox needs no introduction to many people of this section especially in the Patagonia District, but to those to whom he is a stranger, it might be interesting to know something about him.

He is a technical mining graduate coming from the Colorado College. He has been connected with the mining and metallurgical business since 1906. In his fifteen years of practical mining experience some of his most important connections have been with some of the larger mining companies, being with the A. S. & R. as chief chemist for five years at Durango Colorado, Pueblo Colo., and Perth Timboy, N. J. He was later connected with the Sherwin-Williams Paint and Varnish Co., at their Zinc Plant at Magdalena New Mexico where he had charge of their floatation mill handling very rebellious zinc ores. In 1918 he was chief metallurgist for the Lower California Metals Co., three miles north of Nogales handling molybdenum-copper ores from the Pillar Mine. After which he was connected with Mr. C. A. Pierce in their Patagonia Engineering and assaying business. Yesterday Mr. Cox arrived in Nogales from Dos Cabazos, Arizona where he was in charge of a gold mill which was shut down awaiting further mine developments.

Mr. Miller has been established in Nogales since 1912 and has been doing assaying and ore and bullion buying mainly. It will be the intention of the partnership to enlarge this branch, by the purchasing of new equipment especially to handle more unripe work from the smelters, to install floatation testing apparatus, to do more engineering and mine examination work and reporting on prospects in Northern Sonora and the West Coast of Mexico, as well as in Southern Arizona. In this partnership the Nogales Office and laboratory and all outside work will always have one or the other in personal charge.

**SUIT IS FILED AGAINST NEW INDUSTRIAL BOARD**

PHOENIX, Apr. 18.—As had been threatened, an injunction suit was filed in the superior court this afternoon seeking to knock the law creating the industrial commission into a cocked hat.

The suit was filed by attorneys F. C. Struckmeyer and Louis B. Whitney, J. L. Crisman a building contractor of Phoenix is made the plaintiff. At the time that Mr. Whitney was a member of the board of directors of state institutions, Mr. Crisman was hired as superintendent of construction in the building of the new wing of the capital.

Hearing on a petition for an order granting a temporary injunction against the state auditor, treasurer and members of the newly appointed commission, will be had at 9:30 this morning. The prayer of the injunction is that these state officials be prohibited from paying out any funds under the terms of the new law until the suit has been disposed of in the courts.

If the petition is granted by the court, it will probably mean that the suit will be dragged through the superior court, the state supreme court and the United States supreme court. In such an event it will very likely mean that the commission will hardly be able to function for a year or more.

**Rynning Is Named Superintendent Of State Prison**

PHOENIX, Apr. 18.—Tom Rynning, of Phoenix was appointed superintendent of the state prison, following the resignation of C. G. Powell.

Mr. Rynning will take office immediately. The work will not be new to him, as he held the position of prison head under the de facto administration of Governor Campbell. During the war he was for a time in command of the Home Guard of Phoenix.

While nothing official was given out as to the real reason for the resignation of Mr. Powell, it is said that a difference of opinion on the interpretation of the terms of Mr. Powell's remuneration existed between the administration and the superintendent. The pay for the office includes a stipulated salary and "found." The disagreement arose over the extent of the term "found," it is said.

**INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION IN APPOINTED**

PHOENIX, Apr. 16.—L. I. Henry, of Globe; Joseph Lord, of Phoenix; and Herbert E. Hodgson, of Morenci, were announced at the governor's office this afternoon as members of the state industrial commission. The commission is created by the terms of substitute senate bill 85 of the last legislature.

The appointments being announced at the eleventh hour of the time within which the members are directed by the terms of the bill to meet at the capitol and organize curiosity as to the identity of the appointees had reached a high tension point. When the news spread through the state-house audience sighs of relief rose from all corners to the dome of the building.

Rumors as to the identity of the appointees began to crystallize this morning with the arrival at the capitol of Mr. Henry and Mr. Lord. Mr. Hodgson is expected to arrive in Phoenix Saturday morning.

Mr. Henry, who is a republican, received the appointment which runs for six years. He has been a resident and a practicing attorney of Globe for 17 years. He is 53 years old and a native of Iowa, moving from his native state to New Mexico in 1890, where he practiced law in Ateece and Gallup. He moved to Globe in 1904. At times he has been district and city attorney of the city. He is married and has a family.

Mr. Lord, who received the four-year term, is a man of nation-wide reputation in labor and industrial circles. He has lived in Phoenix for about three years. He is a member of the United Mine Workers of America in which organization he has taken an active part ever since he was a boy working in the coal mines of Illinois.

Mr. Lord came into prominence particularly in labor circles of the west and southwest as federal mediator in labor disputes during the period of the war. At that time he represented the United States department of labor and had jurisdiction over the Arizona, Utah, and Nevada districts. In the capacity of mediator he earned the praise of both employer and employee. He settled many of war labor disputes in the district before they gained headway. His work has taken him to practically every metal mining camp in the southwest district.

Although born at Leeds, England, Mr. Lord was brought to America when he was a little over a year old. When a boy 13 years old he worked as a trapper boy in the coal mines at Farmington, Ill. Following service of 15 years in the mines, he became editor of the Peoria Labor News, which position he held for two years. He was president of the Peoria Federation of Labor for three terms. He is a member of a family which has been unusually active in labor circles on the side of conservatism. His father was a coal miner. His brother, James Lord is one of the country's most prominent labor leaders, being president of the mining division of the American Federation of Labor.

Mr. Lord is 23 years old, is married, and has three children. He is a democrat.

The third member of the commission, Herbert E. Hodgson, is a resident of Morenci, holding the position of safety engineer and mine inspector for the Morenci branch of the Phelps Dodge corporation. He is a mining engineer by profession, graduating with the class of 1917 from the University of Arizona school of Mines, following three years at the school of mines of the University of Wisconsin. He is the youngest member of the commission, being 39 years old. He served two years with the field artillery in the world war, part of which time was spent overseas. He held the rank of lieutenant.

Mr. Hodgson's father is Capt. J. P. Hodgson, general manager of the Morenci branch of the Phelps Dodge corporation. He is a republican.

The commission will meet at its offices in the old senate chamber Saturday morning and will elect a chairman and a secretary. The industrial commission promises to be one of the most important commissions in the state government. It has complete jurisdiction over all matters concerning the relations between employer and employee in the state. The law creating the commission carries with it an appropriation of a little over \$100,000. The commissioners receive each a salary of \$4000 a year. The secretary and his salary must receive the approval of the commission.

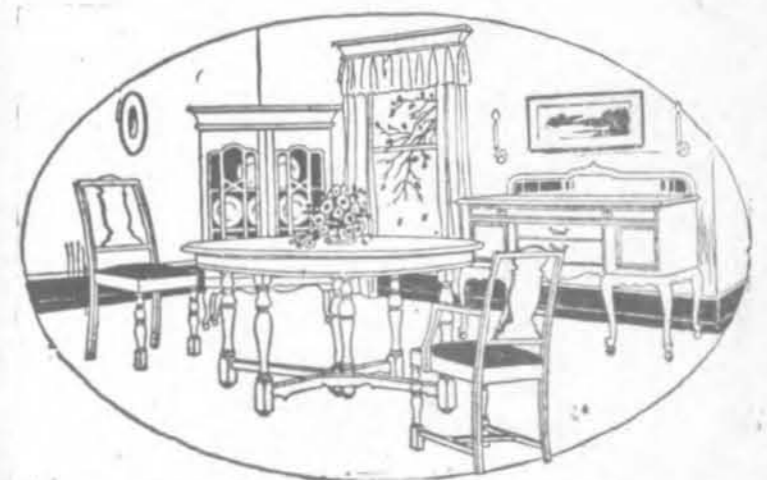

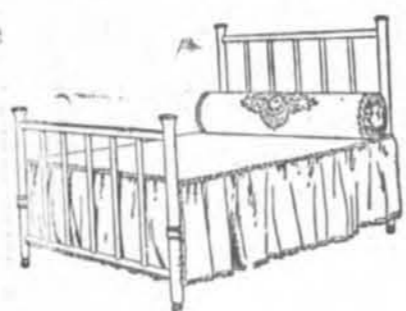

## Sore Politicians Still Feel Sting Of Defeat

PHOENIX, Apr. 21.—The federal grand jury for the Phoenix district was impaneled today. The jury adjourned shortly after organizing and electing T. E. Collins, of Phoenix, foreman. Considerable interest attaches to this session of the grand jury inasmuch as an insistent rumor is afloat on the streets that those who have been "out after the scalp of Ralph Cameron" will seek to secure an indictment of the senator in connection with alleged campaign expenditures. It will be recalled that an inspector from the department of justice called recently at the office of Ernest Hall, secretary of state, and examined Senator Cameron's statement of expenses in connection with his recent election to the senate.

Friends of the senator declare that every effort is being made to bring about the undoing of Senator Cameron by means at hand. The filing of a damage suit against the senator by a woman is said to be merely a part of this campaign of destruction. The rumor as to probable efforts to indict the grand jury in the senator's affairs is based largely upon this information.

Coincidentally with the convening of the grand jury, it is announced that Ralph Cameron, the senator's son, will arrive in Phoenix tonight or tomorrow.

**WANTS WAGE BOARD**  
LONDON, Apr. 20.—Demands for the establishment of a National Wage Board and a National Wage Pool were reaffirmed by large majorities by district Committees of Miners throughout the country is claimed by "The Herald" an organ of organized labor. British mine owners met yesterday and announced that they had completed their proposal which met with many of the demands of the miners.

## FRENCH PREPARING TO FORCE GERMANS TO PAY PENALTIES

PARIS, Apr. 21.—Germany reparations proposals have not yet been received by the French government but officials declared they expected them to be the same as those published in German news-

papers. For this reason, it is said the terms will be (insufficient and unacceptable) to the French government. A completed plan for economic penalties will be placed upon Germany in default of payment, says the Echo De Paris.

## U. S. AMBASSADOR TO ENGLAND CRITICIZED BY MISSISSIPPI SOLON

WASHINGTON, Apr. 21.—Senator Harrison, democrat, of Mississippi charged in the senate that the appointment of George Harvey by President Harding as Ambassador to Great Britain was a "reward for his efforts," and to discredit the Wilson administration. Senator Harrison said Harvey's

pursuit of Wilson through his journals and otherwise was only comparable to Milton's "hell hounds that were stationed at the gates of the infernal regions." He added, Ambassador Harvey had "no equal as a creator of prejudice and stirrer of strife" and that he "was a vindictive self appointed intolerable political accident."

## FAMOUS ROADWAY MAY BE REPAIRED

PHOENIX, Apr. 21.—The Maricopa county highway commission together with representatives of the local chamber of commerce and the state highway department took up this afternoon the matter of repairing the Apache Trail.

The Apache Trail is considered, so it was said, one of the best advertising attributes of the state. As such it is proposed to keep it in such condition as will justify the various railroads and touring bureaus to advertise the trail as one of the scenic wonders of the world.

While it is true that certain money appropriated under the terms of the omnibus bill will go toward repairing the trail, the meeting this afternoon sought to bring about the cooperation of the county and the state in obtaining additional county and federal aid.

## DISCREPANCIES FOUND IN COCHISE ACCOUNTS

BISBEE, Ariz., April 19.—Alleged discrepancies in the accounts of the county treasurer totaling \$35,400 were reported to the board of supervisors of Cochise county today by G. W. Brown, assistant state examiner, following an audit of the books for several years back. The alleged discrepancies included 600 separate items, Brown said. As the result of the investigation, former County Treasurer W. P. Walker, is arrested under \$10,000 bond since last December, will be brought to trial soon on a charge of embezzlement, according to John F. Ross, county attorney.

## POSTMASTER OF BISBEE HELD FOR TRIAL

BISBEE, Ariz., Apr. 19.—Postmaster L. R. Bealey was tonight arrested by federal postal authorities on a charge of misappropriating postal funds. Following his arraignment before United States Commissioner James Allison, Bealey was placed in jail in lieu of \$50,000 bond.

Postal inspectors have been checking over accounts in the local postoffice since April 5, the date on which they arrived here to investigate the theft of approximately \$40,000 from the postoffice safe on the night of April 3.

According to Bailey's story, he was forced by two masked Mexicans to open the safe and hand over to them the package of currency, consigned to a local bank, and several thousand dollars in postal funds. After taking the money, Bailey said, the two men bound and gagged him and placed him in a small room in the postoffice where he remained until following morning.

The specific charge on which Bailey was arrested was misappropriating \$175 of postal savings funds. Federal authorities said tonight that the charge on which Bailey is held was not filed in connection with the robbery of the postoffice on April 3.

C. W. Hicks, of this city, today received a telegram from the postoffice department at Washington, directing him to take charge of the local postoffice pending the outcome of the charge against Bailey.

## OBREGON CALLS BANKERS FOR CONFERENCE

MEXICO CITY, Apr. 21.—Honest efforts are being made to devise arrangements for immediate payment on the interest on Mexico's foreign debt and to that end representatives of foreign banking houses have been asked to come to Mexico to offer advice and suggestions, President Obregon told a gathering of newspaper correspondents here today. It is believed these banking house representatives will arrive here within two or three weeks and that extended conferences will be held with the president participating personally.

President Obregon reiterated previous statements that he strongly favored a payment, no matter what the amount, as an evidence of good faith. El Universal says that Speyer and company, of New York, who are said to hold 70,000,000 pesos in Mexican bonds, have reached a virtual agreement with the government, but will be represented at the conference of bankers to lead aid in making a final settlement with other creditors.

Apparently President Obregon has assumed personal supervision of this phase of the financial situation.

## YOUTH OF FRANCE WILL RALLY TO BANNER OF LAFAYETTE

PARIS, Apr. 18.—Orders calling to the colors the military classes of 1918 and 1919 have been received at Lille to report to that city. The Order was forecasted last week when steps it was said would be taken by France against Germany in case the Berlin government refused to meet reparations and payments, discussed. At the National Veterans Union meeting yesterday the member passed resolutions exhorting that young men be called to the colors. The call issued was to the effect that they "respond valiantly as did elders in nineteen fourteen."

TOKYO, Apr. 26.—The cabinet decided that there was no reason to alter Japan's policy on the Yap mandate question because of the recent American note on the subject, according to a Nichi-Nichi decision in the industry which will be reported Friday at an extraordinary meeting of the diplomatic advisory council, says newspapers.
