The new wage scale, which will be virtually identical with that in effect before March 16, when the copper companies posted a voluntary increase in wages, will be effective on and after November 1, the same date upon which indlar reductions became effective in Utah, Montana, New Mexico, Idaho and Nevada.

#### WESTERN

Michael J. Boyle, Chicago tabor leader, and Ben Newmark, were released from jall recently when commutations of their six months' jail sentences for contempt of court granted by Gov. Len Small were delivered to Sheriff Edwin Ahlstrom.

Inquiry by the Navy Department to fix responsibility for the loss of seven destroyers and a score of men off Honda Point, Calif., last Sept. 8, entered a more serious phase with Secretary Denby's order for the immediate convening of a general court-martial to try eleven naval officers on duty with the squadron.

The constitution of the United States was framed when individual citizens for the first time recognized the necessity of restraining themselves in their own sovereign power, Walter W. Head of Omaha, president of the American Bankers' Association, declared in an address in Omaha before the Nebraska bankers' annual convention.

Following capture of the bandlts in Indianapolis, Ind., between \$50,000 and \$60,000 in securities and cash stolen from the Belvedere State Bank near Los Angeles last August, was shipped to the California institution by Sheriff Tom Desmond of Tacoma. It was recovered from the Puvallup river about four weeks ago and turned over to the sheriff.

The municipality of Oakland has entered upon an avowed campaign to "put the one-man street cars out of business." Big city-owned motor busses have appeared with the announcement that they would take passengers anywhere a one-man street car would take them, and for 1 cent less fare. In addition the penalties against jitney busses using the main streets were dropped from the jitney ordin-

### WASHINGTON

The United States will avoid interference in the struggle between Berlin and Paris over the integrity of the German empire, it was made plain in behalf of President Coolidge at the White House,

Co-operation between the western states and those of the South in seeking expansion of the government's reclamation policy to embrace all sections of the country will be the object of the forestry, reclamation and home-making conference to be conducted at New Orleans, Nov. 19-22, It was appounced in correspondence made public in Washington a few days ago.

American exports of animal products and meats showed a marked increase during September as compared with stop an airplane that had made a land-September a year ago, while the exports of products in the grain, fruit crowd after the pilot had been tossed and vegetable divisions decreased. Figures prepared by the Commerce Department gave the September total of valued at \$13,520,489, against \$66,045,-583 pounds, valued at \$10,819,150 a year ago.

Probibition Commissioner Haynes has launched a new campaign against home brew. In order to stamp out what he characterized as "the menace" of trafficking in home brew ingredients he announced a few days ago that he would revoke the permits of all brewerles which continue the practice of making malt syrups, now widely used as a base for home-made beers.

The Interior Department has refused to grant permission to the Wyoming North & South Railroad Company to construct a line across the Salt Creek oll fields in Wyoming. It was explained that the proposed line would "interfere seriously with the development of oil in the field and with the rights of oil leases." All public lands in the Salt Creek field have been reserved.

Two new government hospitals for tubercular ex-service men will be built in Livermore, Calif., and Los Angeles, Callf., it was announced in Washington a few days ago by Director Hines of nancial loss of \$13,500,078, according the United States veterans' bureau. Each hospital will contain 250 beds, but will be enlarged as conditions justify. Bids will be asked within thirty days, sald Hines.

#### FOREIGN

Leading Manila legislators have declared war to a finish to obtain independence for the Philippines and the removal of Gov. Gen. Leonard Wood, and his replacement by a Filipino.

The American and allied diplomatic delegations have been officially notifled that Angora no longer considers them as high commissions, and that they will benceforth be designated as "representations." The American at Constantinople Insists upon retaining the title of high commission.

A movement by separatists for an independent republic in the Rhineland was begun when two proclamations informing the inhabitants of the Aix La Chapelle that their government had been changed were signed by Leo Deckers and Dr. Guthardt, and were posted in Aux La Chapelle.

The movement started by Aurello Manrikue in the state of San Luis Potosl, Mexico, to take over the governorship has failed and Manrique is reported to have taken refuge, disguised, in Mexico City, while the dissatisfied elements which supported the attempted coup d'état have been dispersed.

Unusually heavy rains caused the slide of a large quantity of earth which covered the Panama railroad tracks for a distance of 300 feet about three miles from Pedro Miguel, resulting in suspension of traffic between Panama and Colon. The slide was sixteen feet deep at one point. A provisional track was built around the slide.

Republican headquarters in Dublin 6,262 Sinn Feln prisoners on hunger strikes in Free State jails. Demobilization of the Free State army is proceeding at the rate of 500 men weekly. The army strength was put at 38,900 men. It is reported that the famous Weston Jones of San Francisco. Dublin secret service is being "sbanded.

Nikolal Lenin, premier of Russia, has completely recovered the use of his paralyzed leg and is able to mount the stairs to the second floor of his residence unaided, according to a statement made in Moscow a few days ago by Dr. N. Samashko, commissary of public health, who is one of the physiclans attending Lenin. The premier is anxious to begin work and the physiclans are having difficulty in restrain-

ing him. Violent incidents have occurred in Alx-La-Chapelle. The police decided to oppose the Separatists and tried to tear down the Rhineland colors from public buildings. A squadron of Belgian cavalry turned out, ready to intervene if necessary. Later the police fired on a group of Republicans who replied. Several persons were killed. Six towns are known to have been occupied by the Separatists in addition to Aix-La-Chapelle. They are Munchen-Gladbach, Crefeld, Julich, Mont-Jole, Cleve and Duren.

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SUGAR OUTPUT OF COLORADO WILL SUPPLY WHOLE COUNTRY

Denver- Unorado is the most bupersont sugar producing state in the Union. Factories in the state this year are converting 2,000,000 tons of raw sugar beets into 500,000,000 pounds of sugar, more than four pounds for every man, woman and child in the United States.

The beet tonnage is being barvested on 175,000 acres of land in the irrigated sections of the state. Sixteen sugar farraries are operating twentyfour hours every day to extract the sugar. Two factories in the Arkansas calley are idle, the construction of facteries in that district having exceeded a reasonable expectation of beet here-

Probably \$15,000,000 or more will be paid to the 6,000 or 7,000 beet growfarmers in the state for their 1923 crop. This estimate is based on \$8 a ton, but the price the farmers will receive will depend upon the sugar content of the crop and also upon the net price per bag realized by the facbornes. In this way the farmers abare in the profits of the industry.

No other crop grown in Colorado is marketed on such a fair basis. If the price of flour advances after a farmer ass sold his grain to the null he ob tains no share in the increased price. 



## FIGURES SHOW VALUE OF DIVERSIFICATION

Sales in Kansas and Minnesota Make Striking Contrast.

Farmers in Minnesota, where dairy ng is the largest industry, are, on the whole, more prosperous than in Kansas, where wheat is the leading factor, An analysis of the distribution of farmers' cash income in these states shows the stability of the animal products industries and the commutative

depression in one-crop farming. Comparing total figures for the two states, it is seen that farm income in Minnesota has risen the farther above pre-war levels; that this state suffered relatively less in the recent depres slon; that it has experienced a more rapld recovery and promises to have an increase in cash receipts the coming year, whereas the outlook is for deeline in Kansas.

Gross cash income in Kansas rose from 273 million dollars in 1969 to 699 million in 1919, a gain of 123 per cent. In the low year 1921 it fell to 317 mil-Hon, a loss of 48 per cent, rising in 1922 to 346 million, a 9 per cent in-Crease.

In Minnesota total sales rose from 159 million dollars in 1909 to 471 mil. Boutell, calf salesman. tion in 1919, a gain of 196 per cent, declined to 275 million, or 42 per cent, In 1921, and last year showed an increase of 51 million dollars, which

amounts to 19 per cent over 1921. In Kansas the bulk of the farm income is derived from sales of crops and live stock, the leading items be ing wheat, cattle and bogs. In Minne sota, on the other hand, close to half of the receipts from sales come from the unimal products group-dairy products being by far the largest Item -followed by hogs, wheat and cartle in order. Last year, however, wheat

> Freaks of Climate Shown. Through underground observation stations, scientists have recently completed a series of experiments that indicate Mt. Desert Island, a few miles off the coast of Maine, has a higher average temperature and greater evaporation than Long Island, more than 200 miles to the south. The recording instruments consist of thermometers that register maximum and minimum temperatures and specially designed bottles, filled with distilled water and fitted with porous stoppers that protrude above the ground. When the sun strikes them, the liquid is drawn from the glass containers in the same manner that moisture is extracted from the earth. Measurements of the water are taken at intervals and the differences noted give the amount of evaporation. On this Island, trees, flowers, and plants that are characteristic of the lands of ice and the more southern climes thrive, while birds of the Arctic and the southland make it their common home during the spring and summer months.-Popular Mechanics.

The Tomb of Cyrus.

In a remarkable ruin, in a tolerable state of preservation, at l'asargadae in ancient Babylonia, is the tomb of Cyrus. It has been called "a house upon a pedestal," and consists of a pyramidal base constructed of huge blocks of white marble, surmounted by a house of the same material, covered with a Sloping stone roof. The interior consists of a small chamber, ten feet long, seven feet wide and eight feet high, entered by a low and narrow door; there was deposited, in a golden coffin, the body of the great conqueror. It is supposed that a row of 24 columns (some of whose broken shafts still remain) enclosed the sacred spot, On these mutilated columns is repeatedly found the inscription (written in Persian and in the so-called Median): "I am Cyrus the King, the Achae-

Last venr President Harding, accompanied by Secretaries Weeks and Denby of the War and Navy departments, placed a wreath of red, white and blue blossoms on this putional shrine. Then the president saluted and turned away. Not a word was snoken. The silence was broken only by the clatter of the hoofs of the cavalry escort and the borning of distant guns in the national salute.

This year another hand must place that wreath, And when America stands with bared head and face to the East there will be remembrance of the kindly gentleman and true patriot, unspolled by pride of place, who has "Gone West" to Join the boys "Over There." And what of Germany It begins to she were on her knees at 'ast. Apparently-it is not safe to put it more st.ongly-the truth has at last been forced upon the German consclousness that in the great four-year struggle which convulsed the world and impoverished it in life and treasure Germany was decisively and conclusively beaten. Never, until the official and public and unconditional abandonment of passive resistance in the Rubr, bus Germany given acknowledgment that the victory in the test of war was absolute.

So 1923 sees a second surrender by Germany, of hardly less importance than that of Armistice day of 1918. Another thought for the moment of silence!

November 11 at the eight American cemeteries in France, Belgium and England, there remain the bodies of 30,363 soldiers, sallers and marines who gave their lives during the war. At each of these, from the Mense-Argonne, Aisne-Marne, Suresnes, St. Mihlel, the Somme, Olse-Alsne In France, in Flanders field in Belgium and at Brookwood in England, appropriate services were held thoughout the day with American diplomatte or military and mayal officials paying tribute.

November 11 is not the only "Armistice day." The year is full of days that are "Armlstice days" in spirit.

In June the disubled American veterans. through National Commander J. A. McFarland, placed a wreath on the tomb at Arlington.

On the Fourth of July was unveiled in Parts a monument to the American volunteers who enfisted in the French army in 1914-15. The statue which surmounts the monument strikingly suggests Alan Seeger, the soldier poet who wrote that immortal poem "I Have a Rendezvous With

In the spring at Selcheprey the First division, A. E. F., was honored by France by the dedication of a monument, a photograph of which is reproduced herewith. The First division fought the buttle of Scicheprey early in 1918.






