Jazz, First Music In History To Become An International Issue



Legislation Passed Upon It in European Countries

New York City.—Like jealous little boys, English and European musicians are sticking out their tongues at American singers and musicians and chanting, "you can't come over to my house and play." Ed Smalle and Dick Robertson, radio favorites and two of Broadway's headline warblers, recently returned from London, declare that it is time America retaliated for the discrimination foreign countries are showing toward modern American music. "Never before has the music of one country been discriminated against in any place in the world," declares Mr. Smalle. "But today you find abroad active antagonism against American jazz. There is no hostility toward foreign music in America. We have always and will always demand foreign popera. The popularity of American jazz with the European public is so great that native musicians must do one of two things—learn to play it or accept American talent," Mr. Robertson adds. "To do both would be the most intelligent and generous gesture they could make. The foreign public demand for American music is so insistent that something must be done. We were treated with great courtesy and acclaim. On occasion, because of union regulations, American musicians have not been permitted to play with English orchestras. But when the European public does receive you, as they did us, their welcome is most enthusiastic. We found that they liked our ballads better than any other type of music. 'I Tore Up Your Picture When You Said Goodbye' was an especial favorite. The foreign musicians can interpret the ballad type better than they can 'hot' music. 'I Tore Up Your Picture When You Said Goodbye' tells a universal story, and it made no difference in what country we sang it, it was always well received."

TERM OF LEGISLATORS IN DOUBT

Phoenix, Dec. 27.—Expiration date of legislators' term of office, discussed in the senate at the beginning of the present special session, again rose as a major problem this afternoon when the farm bloc renewed irrigation demands and halted the house as it prepared for final reading of the bill which would denact the revised code as the law of Arizona.

This unexpected delay, close observers say, may prevent completion of the code task by next Monday night, which raised the controversy of tenor of office. Some believe the 8th Legislature passes out of existence at midnight, December 31, but others think they may legally remain in session until the first Monday in January.

In spite of the delay today, leaders said, it is possible to complete the work by next Monday, but it is likely that night sessions may be required in that case.

PENNEY EMPLOYEES GET \$400,000 BONUS FOR CHRISTMAS

Christmas bonus checks distributed by the J. C. Penney Company among 11,021 stores now in operation totaled \$412,307, and 4832 women employees participated in the distribution.

Women participants included office employees in New York and St. Louis offices and in the branch offices, as well as in the stores, which are located in 47 states.

The present system of yearly bonuses has been in operation to the J. C. Penney Company organization for many years, and the individual bonuses are based on salary and years of service. Women associates in the stores receive bonus in proportion to length of service and sales records.

Total bonuses distributed last year in the J. C. Penney organization was \$320,000.

Ten employees of the local J. C. Penney store participated in the bonuses given out this year, according to R. H. Burns, manager. Maximum bonus for length of service went to Miss Lolita Yungo. Other participants in the distribution of bonus checks are: Mrs. J. Griffith, Misses Amalia Manuel, Angel Gayou, Eva Saurez, Isabel Cota Robles, Louisa Mazon, Pastora Islas, Margorita O'Donnell, and Natalia Bennett.

MORNING GLORY ORE TESTED AT BUREAU OF MINES

Samples of Morning Glory ore were run through a test Thursday at the sampling mill in the mines building of the University of Arizona. The test was made in order to determine the kind of treatment best suited for the product of the mine, so the management can build a mill to suit the mine. The ore sampled averaged about 5 per cent copper with some 100 values. The concentrates averaged better than 20 per cent.

Mr. J. A. Hamilton, general manager of the Morning Glory, states that more than a million and a half tons of ore are blocked out at the mine, which will keep a mill busy for an indefinite period. The new mill will be constructed in the immediate future, it is said.

Chattanooga, Tenn., capitalists are developing the mine, which is one of the older mines of the Patagonia district. The mine has a great future.

YUMA ISN'T VERY DRY

Phoenix, Dec. 25.—Federal agents working out of the Phoenix office of John H. Udall, prohibition administrator, had to buy liquor in the street because places they visited while in Yuma over the holiday couldn't even provide standing room inside," they declared. Several merry parties were broken up by the agents, they said, and four persons were arrested on charges of violating the national prohibition act.

MRS. A. E. SANDERS SUFFERS BROKEN BONE IN AUTO WRECK

Nogales, Dec. 27.—Mrs. A. E. Sanders, wife of A. E. Sanders, president of Piggly Wiggly Southwestern Company and the Clarence Saunders Stores of Arizona and New Mexico, received a broken collarbone and other body injuries this morning a short distance west of Tombstone, when the automobile she was driving struck a soft shoulder on the highway and upset.

Mrs. N. D. Pomeroy, Mrs. E. Taylor Wilkey and Mrs. Sanders' daughter, Dorothy, who were in the wrecked car, received minor injuries. All were brought to Nogales and taken to their homes. The accident occurred about 8 o'clock in the morning. The party had started for El Paso to visit Mrs. Sanders' parents.

According to Mrs. Pomeroy, who was riding in the rear seat with Mrs. Wilkey, Mrs. Sanders apparently became blinded by the sun as she rounded a cemetery curve. The car swerved to the side of the road, causing the driver to lose control as the front wheels struck the soft shoulder of the road. Mrs. Pomeroy and Mrs. Wilkey were thrown through the top of the car, landing on their heads and injuring their backs.

MIZE MURDER NOT CONNECTED WITH BOOZE, POLICE SAY

Tucson, Dec. 27.—The theory that O. L. Mize, Tucson motor dealer, died a victim of members of the "boozie racket" was definitely discarded here yesterday as officers of the police department eliminated one after another in that direction all having provided without foundation. Additional information regarding the activities of the victim in the case turned their attention elsewhere, and tonight the search is directed on a new tangent in which rum running plays no part. The question now is: "Find the woman in the case."

The theory that Mize met his death at the hands of some one with a real or fancied grievance involving money was advanced, but this is only a theory, as no check in that direction has yet been made.

SUMMER SCHOOL AT FLAGSTAFF

Tucson, Dec. 27.—With Dr. J. W. Claron, dean of the University College of Education, and Dean T. O. Bellwood, of the Northern Arizona Teachers' College, as co-directors of the 1929 summer session, the University of Arizona will again convene for vacation studies at Flagstaff. Summer school was held there last year.

There will be but one session this coming summer, and that will be from June 17 to August 16. Credits will be accepted from the summer session at either of the two schools, it was stated.

15,000 MAY BE TOLL OF FLU

Washington, D. C., Dec. 27.—Surgeon General Cummings said today that he viewed the influenza situation as "serious," and believed there was "every indication" that the outbreak will spread through the Atlantic states. He added that deaths this year might exceed 15,000.

Deaths in the 1918 epidemic were 50,000 in excess of the normal number from the disease. In 1920 there were 100,000 excess deaths and in 1927 there were between 15,000 and 20,000.

WALTER P. CHRYSLER'S TRAFFIC TALKS

EDUCATING CHILDREN IN SAFETY
The need for educating children in the primary grades along lines which will tend to promote safety is being recognized in a number of states. At the present time seven states—New Jersey, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Wisconsin and Wyoming—require the teaching of safety or traffic regulation in the public schools. Every state should have such a law. Every one connected with the automotive industry, working through clubs and other organizations, should aid in the promulgating of such laws. Without the cooperation of individuals, and pedestrians in general, police regulation of traffic itself, especially in the big cities, is of little avail as a safety measure. An understanding of motor laws in some degree is necessary for the pedestrian whether he drives or not. What to expect from a moving car is important information. Education as to one's own movements are not enough. The man on foot, or child on foot, who knows that a car can turn right at a cross street with traffic will not be struck, but will wait for the car to make the turn or at least be aware of the intention of the driver. Pedestrians should also know all traffic signals, speed regulations and police requirements. None of this information is too technical or too complex for the mind of even a child. Steady education along well planned lines should be part of every school program.

'MISCONDUCT' CAUSES LOSS OF INSURANCE

Chicago, Dec. 27.—A widow's conduct apparently is of much importance in determining whether she is to collect on her soldier husband's government war insurance policy.

A federal court decided today, for the second time, that Mrs. Corinne Hanna should not receive further payments on the policy of Major Mark Hanna of Kansas City, although she was named beneficiary.

She had received \$2451 of the \$10,000 due her before the government stopped the monthly installments. The United States Veterans Bureau, after an investigation, charged Mrs. Hanna with living with a man named Wagner, now serving a sentence for bank robbery in the Iowa penitentiary.

NEW YEAR'S DAY

Festivities in celebration of New Year's Day may be traced as far back as 3000 B. C., when the Babylonians observed the day in honor of the sun god. Throughout the ages various days of the year have been considered New Year's Day in various countries. England having observed March 25 as such until the year 1752.

In the church calendar New Year's Day, coming seven days after Christmas, is taken as commemorating the circumcision of Christ, but this religious significance is almost lost sight of in the secular observances pertaining to the beginning of a new year.

The giving of presents or good luck tokens may be traced to ancient Rome and still prevails in some countries. The Persians exchanged eggs on that day. Many customs, pagan, Hebrew, Christian and social, have been associated with New Year's Day. That of holding "watch parties" to see the old year out and the new year in, is observed by some church congregations, while more hilarious proceedings take place in night clubs and other centers of conviviality.

By means of greeting cards, written messages or spoken word, the salutation "Happy New Year" is almost universal. Thus we greet our friends and readers, one and all.

JOKE ON SANTA CLAUS

From Paris, Ky., came a few days before Christmas a sad story to the effect that a little girl of that town, Tillie Oakley by name, was suffering from a severe nervous shock because some one had told her that there isn't any Santa Claus.

The story was circulated far and wide by the press and got immediate and startling results. Letters, telegrams and presents poured into Paris assuring Tillie that Santa Claus is a reality and urging her to cheer up.

Postal and telegraph people began the search for Tillie Oakley in order to deliver the messages and presents, but she could not be found. The Associated Press, which had accepted the press story, also got busy and sent a reporter to investigate, but without success, except to find that even if there isn't any Santa Claus there isn't any Tillie Oakley either. The dispatch was a fake.

RADIO NUISANCES

It must have been encouraging to radio fans to read a recent statement by Commissioner Lafount of the Federal Radio Commission in which he warned broadcasting stations that certain nuisances being perpetrated on the public must stop, under penalty of having their licenses denied or revoked.

Among the abuses against which he warned were deviations from assigned frequency and power, too much sales talk, broadcasting of phonograph records without announcing them as such, and inferior programs generally.

Further reduction in the number of stations on the air was declared probable by Mr. Lafount in a letter to Pacific coast broadcasters, in which he said:

"I told you six months ago that there were too many broadcasting stations in this country. I am still of that opinion and sincerely believe that the character of reception the public wants, and should have, can not be secured until the number of broadcasting stations is greatly reduced. This can be accomplished by the denying or revoking of licenses, or the consolidation of stations."

If the commission shall further carry out its program of reducing the number of stations, by getting off the air those which persist in the abuses of which the commissioner complains, the listening public will be duly grateful.

A USEFUL INVENTION

A comparatively inexpensive apparatus for generating steam for sterilizing purposes in homes, hotels, hospitals, dairy barns or wherever a small and effective sterilizer is needed has been invented by Prof. M. L. Nichols, agricultural engineer of the Alabama Polytechnic Institute.

The outfit is described as being simple in construction and operation, being designed for attachment to any water heater, either electric, gas, wood or coal. Facilities for sterilization in the home as a means toward cleanliness and disease prevention are

coming to be considered necessary by progressive housewives, and the new invention will doubtless be welcomed by them.

Professor Nichols developed the new device as an incident of his research in connection with rural electrification, in which the agricultural college and a southern power company have cooperated. He has patented the patent to the college, so that it may be made available to the public, a generous action which is most praiseworthy.

School kids who are getting long vacations on account of the flu don't consider that malady an unmixed evil.

SILVER-LEAD-COPPER MINE FOR SALE

The Phtsburgh mine, located on Bond Canyon, two miles from the Alto Postoffice, at an elevation of 5500 feet. The group consists of 16 claims, furrowed by a number of veins, carrying valuable ore deposits, many of which have been worked in the past. The main lode at least has been known since the days of the early Spanish miners. The following description is to be found in the U. S. Geological Survey bulletin on the Santa Rita range:

The topography is rough; the country rock is diorite, and the deposits are found in a 9-foot quartz vein which dips 87 deg. N. The veins in general is stained with iron and manganese and a little azurite and malachite; the ore minerals it contains are galenite, pyrite and chalcopryite. Some paleonite occurs in the surface ore, but sulphides are not abundant above the 70-foot level. From that level down the ore consists largely of galenite in a silicified brecciated gangue, and there is a marked increase in chancopryite in the lower part of the mine, where the ore contains also some tetrahedrite.

The ore lodes are found in the Santa Cruz Batholith, and conditions are ideal for a great mine. There are places on the surface where the main lode is over 25 feet wide. This group has a mile and a quarter of this big lode.

The conditions as set forth by the Survey are changed somewhat to the better by the development I have made since I bought the nucleus of the present group. The shaft, equipped with a steam hoist, is now down 200 feet, with a drift on the 125-foot level; a tunnel about 250 feet long, showing a good class of silver ore, making a little water.
