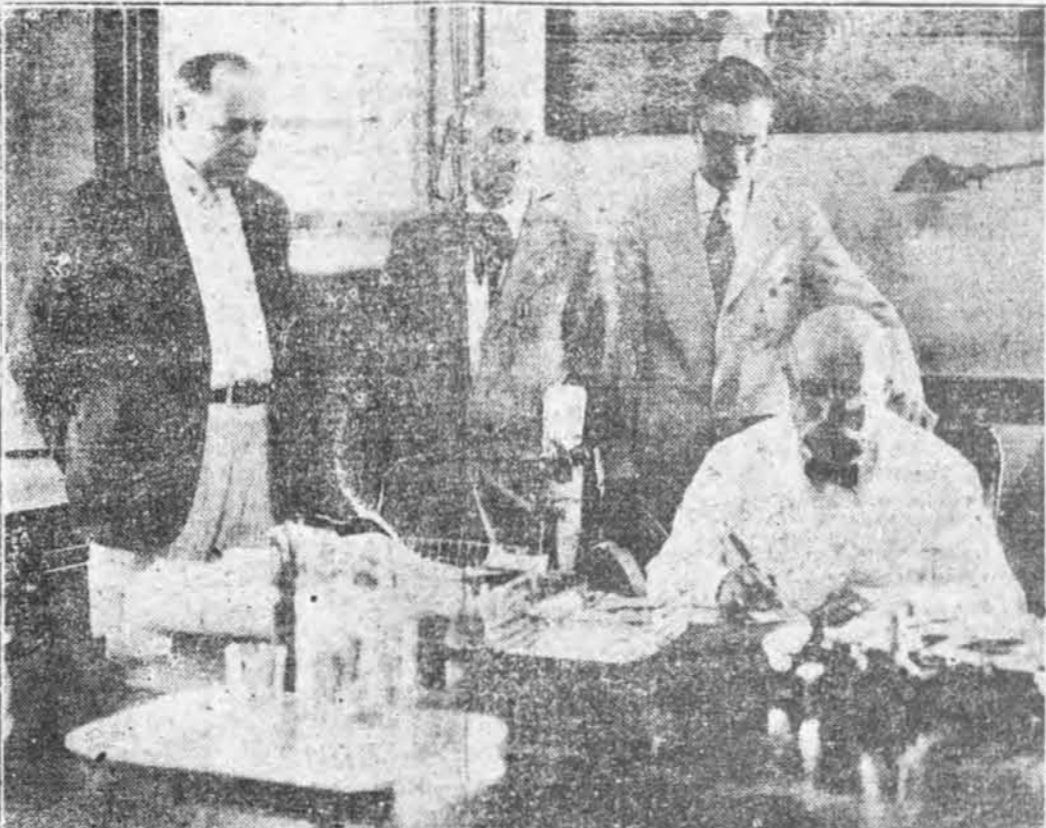
BONSAL NOON IS A CANDIDATE TO SUCCEED HIMSELF

"I have not," the governor replied orally, with emphasis on the negative.

Kansas City, June 20.—The speech being Senator James A. Reed in nomination for the presidency before the Democratic national convention in Houston next week will be an appeal to "pick a fighter to do the job" in view of the fighting campaign ahead.

Charles M. Howell of Kansas City, who will make the speech, will tell the convention that "Hover is made to order for Reed," and that the Missourian ideally fits the situation from a national standpoint and not from the standpoint of state or section.

Clarke, until recently executive vice president of the Consolidated National Bank, and Fred J. Hermes, formerly cashier of the Arizona National Bank, and later vice president of the Consolidated.

At the time the announcement was made it was also stated that Harry A. DeFord, at present vice president of the bank, will remain with the new concern in an official capacity, although the full personnel of the new management will not be announced for several days.

RODEO ARRANGEMENTS ALMOST COMPLETED FOR JULY 4TH

A meeting of the rodeo committee was Tuesday evening at the Circle Z ranch to make final arrangements for the big show to be held on the 4th of July at that most attractive spot. The grounds are being put in order and a second chute is being built, which will insure a continuous program when the contests begin. There will be at least 70 events during the afternoon, including calf roping, bull and mule riding, bronco riding, a three-horse relay race, a cowpony race, and a cigar race.

The following prizes for the contests have been offered: Calf roping—First prize, \$75; second, \$35; third, \$15. Bronco riding—First prize, \$50; second, \$20; third, \$10.

Other prizes will be commensurate with the merits of the affairs.

The 25th Infantry band will give a concert at the grounds, beginning at 11 a. m., and will play during the entire afternoon. An orchestra made up from members of the band will furnish the music for the big dance at the Patagonia opera house, which will wind up a day filled with excitement and pleasure.

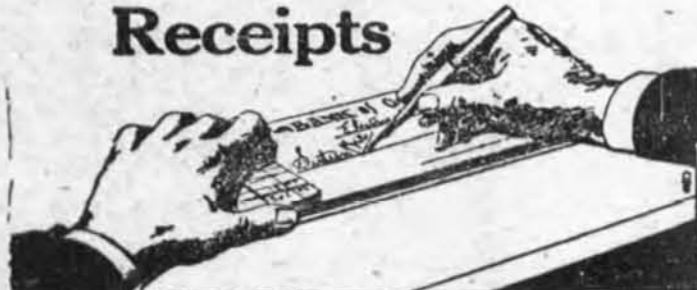

WALTER P. CHRYSLER'S TRAFFIC TALKS



HUNTING NEW LANES OF TRAVEL

Hunting new lanes of travel in going in and out of cities and towns, not only relieves traffic congestion, but becomes a delightful pastime if a motorist has imagination and ingenuity.

Hundreds of thousands of motor cars pass through the well known routes daily, yet there are side streets and short cuts quite as good as far as pavements go, and far better as far as traffic conditions are concerned which the average motorist never sees.

Perhaps the reason for this is that the need for "beating the traffic" never occurs to the driver until he is caught some lovely Sunday afternoon in a well known traffic route, hemmed in by hundreds of other vehicles, all speeded down to the rate of the most sickly and decrepit car in the whole parade. He then makes a whole frantic effort to leave the multitude, only to succeed in getting thoroughly lost and utterly condemned by the other people in his party.

The secret of avoiding traffic, lies in knowing one's routes but the tag end of a long happy day is no time for prospecting.

A good city map and a pencil and one or two hours dedicated expressly to adventuring, saves much time and nervous energy at some later occasion. Attention to the condition of roads at stated times should be noted also. The route that is good at 10.00 A. M. may be terribly congested at 5.00 P. M. The passage that is clear on five week days may be clogged by market traffic on Saturdays.

A good road memory and attention to all traffic conditions is part of the equipment of the good driver.

SALVAGING BAD BOYS

The problem of how to handle "bad" boys is an ever-present one. Still, it may be questioned whether there are really very many boys who are absolutely bad. At the Berkshire Industrial Farm, located at Canaan, N. Y., a valuable experiment is being made. The farm was established for boys sent from various city courts on charges of delinquency. These boys receive academic instruction, combined with training in various trades and agriculture. An almost unique feature of the institution is that there are no locks nor bars to keep them there. They are held in check by moral suasion and interesting activities.

Among these activities is the planting of trees, of which about 150,000 have been set out during the last year. These boys have been led to take an interest and pride in this and other phases of their work. As a consequence, they are laying foundations for useful citizenship when they shall leave the institution to take their places in the world.

It is gratifying to know that most of them do become useful citizens, as records of the school's "graduates" for several years testify.

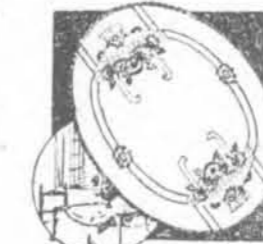

Cattle Finished for the Market

Dry-Lot Feeding and Fattening on Grass Are Two Methods Used.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

In "Feeding Cattle for Beef," which has just been published by the United States Department of Agriculture as Farmers' Bulletin 1549-F, W. H. Black of the Bureau of Animal Industry offers in 16 pages a condensed and simplified analysis of practices in feeding cattle.

Selling Vegetables at Roadside Stands

Should Be Home-Grown and of Good Quality.

To make a successful business of roadside marketing one must have sufficient interest, the right help, a good location, and the willingness to be exacting and pay close attention to details.

The produce sold should be home-grown or raised in the vicinity, and never obtained from city markets. Speaking with special reference to vegetables, he said, a fairly full line should be carried with certain products as a specialty.

The site of the stand should be chosen so it may be seen readily from a distance and should have ample parking space around it.

The salesman is important in building good will and a large trade. He must present a good appearance, must never contradict, be patient, and not too talkative.

Causes of Failures to Secure Alfalfa Stand

Failures to secure stands of alfalfa on reseeding may be due to several causes, farmers interested in new seedlings are being advised.

The bulletin includes average rations for various weights of cattle, simple method of calculating the cost of protein in feeds, suggestions for handling rations and for starting cattle on feed.

Farmers' Bulletin 1549-F may be procured free by applying to the Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

Colorado Has Outlawed Common Barberry Plant

The common barberry and its related horticultural varieties is outlawed in Colorado because of its ability to harbor black-stem rust, a disease causing great losses in wheat.

The order makes it a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of \$5 to \$500 to ship common barberries into the state.

Among the many uses of the rotary hoe, one of the most important is that of breaking up a crust after a hard rain.

Often important uses of the rotary hoe are for preparing fall plowed ground, cultivating corn and beans before they are large enough to plow.

Odors From Weeds Are Quite Difficult to Avoid

If odors come from weeds or garlic in the pasture they are difficult to avoid, but they may be controlled by pasturing the cows in the forenoon.
