New York State Map showing Rural Vote against Gov. Smith in years of his four successful candidacies.

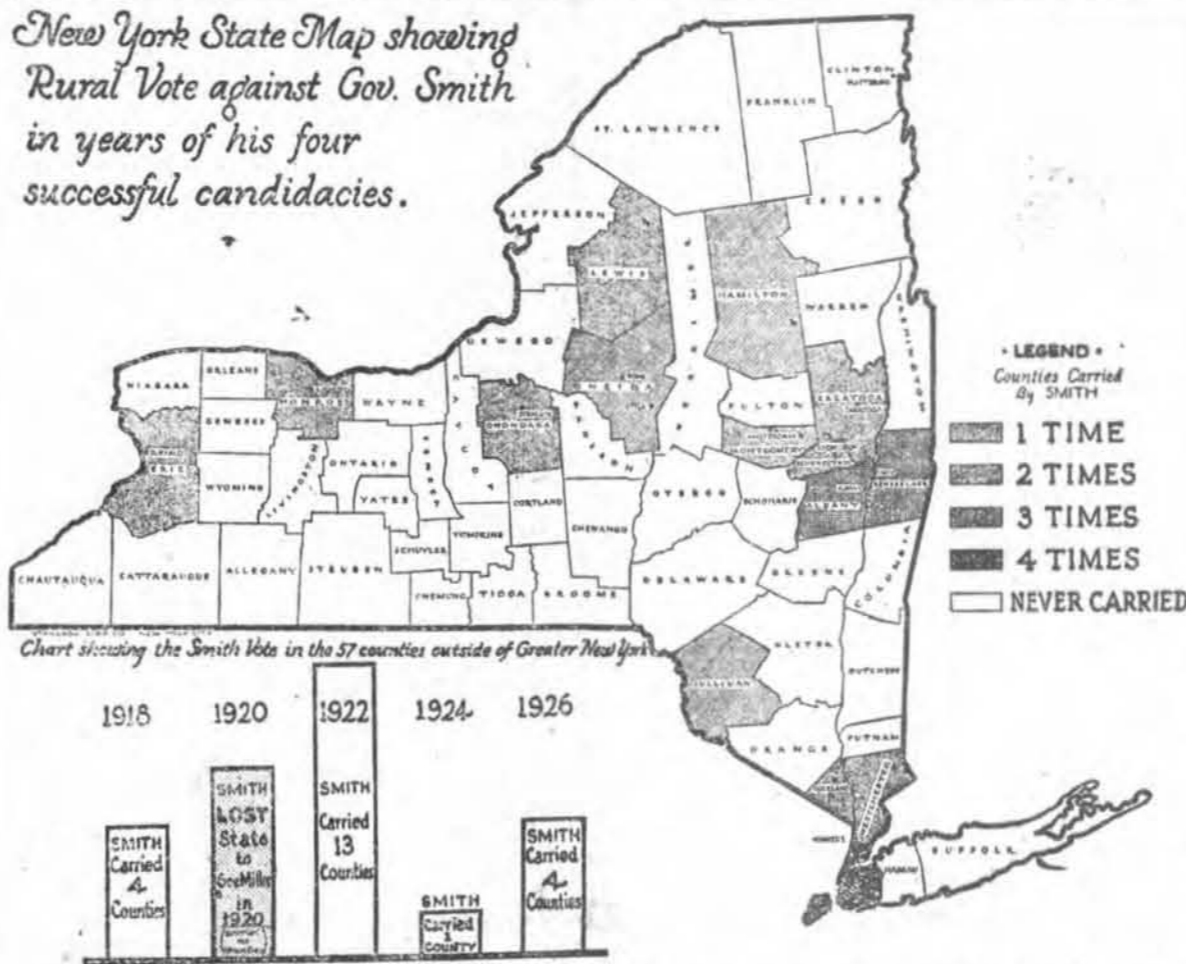


Chart showing the Smith vote in the 57 counties outside of Greater New York

AVIATOR KILLED DOING STUNTS

Mines Field, Los Angeles, Sept. 12.—Lieut. J. J. Williams, 25, perhaps the most daring of army aviators, died yesterday of injuries received last night when his fast plane crashed while stunting. The death of Williams was the first of the 1928 air races. He was flying 150 miles an hour, 100 feet above the ground and upside-down when the motor of his plane faltered and caused the craft to spiral then smash up directly in front of the grandstand. The army pilot was wedged in the cockpit, covered with wreckage.

The army aviators took to the air after the three noted seahawks of the navy had thrilled the audience. They tumbled with daring recklessness at low altitude.

Their older style Boeing P-W9 planes were not equipped to feed the carburetors while flying upside down and the engines sputtered and the ships lost speed as the craft were at the top of the loops.

Williams' plane was seen to falter as he successfully brought it out of a loop and then it crashed to the ground a complete wreck.

COEBEL FAVORITE IN NON-STOP FLIGHT FROM N. Y. TO L. A.

Roosevelt Field, N. Y., Sept. 12.—Nine planes took the air today in a mighty non-stop marathon to Los Angeles, but before many hours were passed two ships had been forced down en route and another had given up the attempt and returned to the starting point.

The six are the Yankee Doodle of Art Gobel, the favorite, another Lockheed era owned by William Thaw II, famous war flyer, who rode as passenger; Charles A. Levine's transatlantic Columbia, a Buhl Sesquiplane piloted by N. B. Mamer of Spokane, and a Bellanca piloted by George Haldeman, Ruth Elder's ocean pilot, and Emil Burgin, known as Long Island's hard luck flier.

FIRST SNOWFALL FOR IDAHO

Boise, Idaho, Sept. 12.—The first snow of the season fell in Idaho today. In the mountains north of here, two to four inches had fallen up until a late hour, while in the Targhee forest near Pocatello a light fall was reported. Reports also said mountains in the Yellowstone national park received a blanket of white.

Captain Anton Heinen, German signer of the ill-fated dirigible Shenandoah, has become an American citizen, passing his immigrant's examination with a rating of 100 per cent. Among the requirements of the test are the ability to read and write.

REPUBLICANS CARRY MAINE

Portland, Me., Sept. 11.—Maine has gone Republican in its state election by more than 60,000, according to late returns.

With the count in all but five counties virtually complete, Republicans were leading by approximately 48,000 and confident that the remaining precincts would increase the figure by possibly 15,000.

Former Governor P. Baxter wired Herbert Hoover shortly after midnight that the Republican majority would be more than 60,000. Joseph W. Simpson, national committeeman from Maine, wired Hubert Work, chairman of the Republican national committee, that the majority would be between 67,000 and 75,000.

Senator Frederick Hale, Republican, who was re-elected, said the outcome of the election indicated an overwhelming victory for Hoover in November.

"As Maine goes, so goes the nation," is the adage which has attached itself to the September election in this state.

Expert Mill Man to Handle Ores From Big Jim and Hardshell; Will Treat 200 Tons Daily

The famous Hardshell lead-silver mine, located near the Big Jim mine, about 10 miles from this town, has been purchased from the Richardson estate by the Big Jim Mines, Inc., of Los Angeles, and work is being rushed getting the property in shape for big production. This mine has a great deal of ore already blocked out. It is the intention of the new owners to treat the Hardshell ore in the Big Jim mill, along with the ore from the Big Jim mine.

Mr. J. J. Burns, who for years has been mill superintendent of the famous El Tigre mines of Mexico, has arrived here and is in charge of all mill operations for the Big Jim company. With Mr. Burns in charge of mill operations, it is a foregone conclusion that successful handling of the ore will result. Milling operations are being conducted on a moderate scale, and will be increased rapidly until a capacity production of 200 tons daily has been reached. Later, when conditions warrant, the mill capacity will be increased to the necessary point required to handle the mines' output.

A force of men, under General Superintendent C. D. Pickering, has been installing machinery and other equipment at the Hardshell for some time, preparatory to getting out a large amount of ore which had been blocked out by former operators. This mine has a history of big production, and many thousands of dollars' worth of ore was shipped to smelters between 1879 and the present time. The mine is developed by shafts to 800 feet depth and by more than 8000 feet of other work, and embraces 23 claims covering about 400 acres of ground. The lode is from 10 to 60 feet wide, averaging about 20 feet. The mine has not been worked on an extensive scale owing to the fact that the ore was considered "complex" in character. That obstacle has been overcome, it is stated, by the new method of selective flotation, lately developed. Mr. Burns, the new mill superintendent, is considered one of the best authorities on the treatment of refractory ores. He has proven that the ore can be handled with a high percentage of extraction.

Manager Fulton has speeded up work at the mine, and has doubled the tonnage going to the smelter. Two 60-ton cars were shipped Monday and two 60-ton cars shipped Tuesday. This schedule can be maintained and probably increased.

In addition to the copper-silver-gold deposits developed by the main tunnel, bodies of high-grade molybdenum are found in the Santo Nino vein. Recently one such ore body produced over \$40,000, which was taken out in a little more than one week's time. The mine has over 600 feet of ore bodies ahead of its present working and has demonstrated 250 feet of ore backs above the main tunnel level.

No attempt has been made to develop the ore below the tunnel level because the operators have been so well satisfied with production on the basis of their operations.

The new program calls for speeding up the work and production is to be materially increased. An extensive development program is planned, which will include opening up the vein at depth.

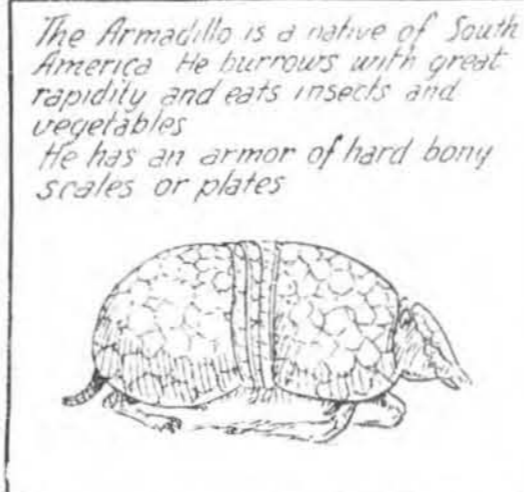

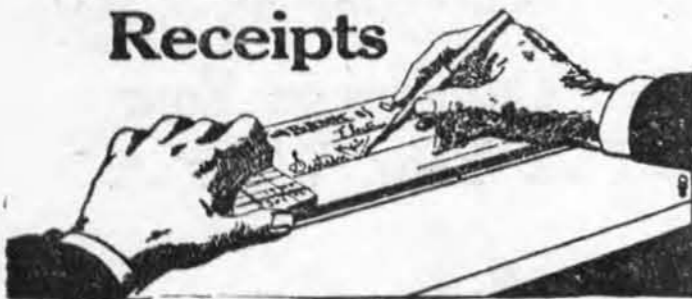

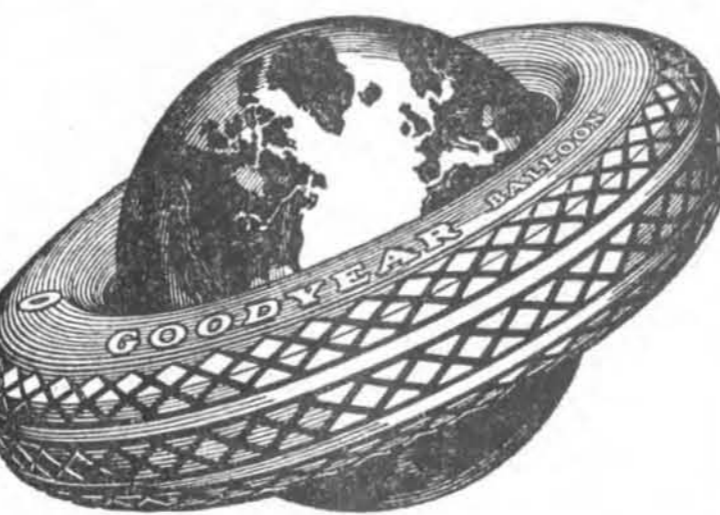

AUSTRALIA FLIERS CROSS TASMANIAN SEA IN PLANE

Auckland, N. Z., Sept. 12.—Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith and Charles P. T. Ulm, California-Australia fliers completed the first crossing of the Tasmanian sea when they landed their tri-motored monoplane Southern Cross here September 9.

The fliers, accompanied by T. H. Williams, radio operator, and H. A. Litchfield, navigator, hopped off from Sydney, N. S. W., at 5:30 p. m. Monday. While passing over the approximate position where Hood and Monrieff, first to attempt the flight, were believed to have crashed last month, the aviators dropped a wreath.

will running three shifts and shipping high-grade ore direct, and with the Morning Glory pushing its extensive preparation program and the Tonopah Mining Company developing the Alto group, the Patagonia district will come into its own as one of the important metal producing sections of the southwest.

Some Good Things to Eat

Lobster Salad.—Two cupsful of cooked lobster is mixed with one hard cooked egg, chopped, salt and pepper to season; add two stalks of finely cut celery, one large red tomato, a tablespoonful each of lemon juice and mayonnaise dressing.

Lobster a la Newburg.—Take one and one-half pounds of lobster meat, heat in two tablespoonfuls of butter, salt, paprika to taste and a tablespoonful of lemon juice.

Veronique Soup.—To three cupsful of veal stock add one cupful of stewed and strained tomato which has been added one-eighth teaspoonful of soda.

Sautéed Lamb Filets.—Take two pounds of lamb from the fore quarter. Wipe, remove bone and cut the meat into one inch strips.

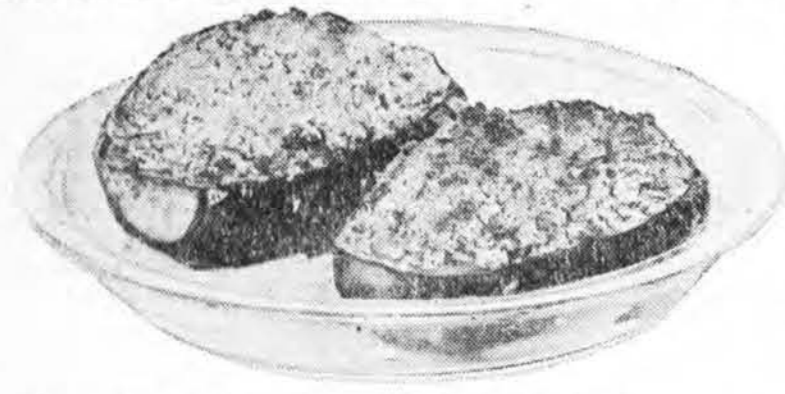

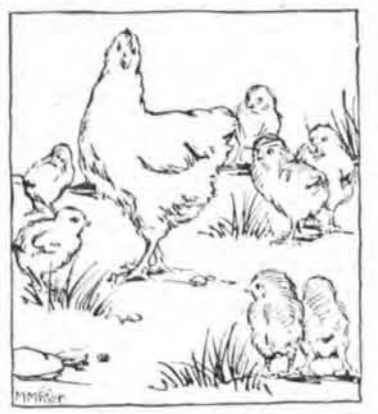

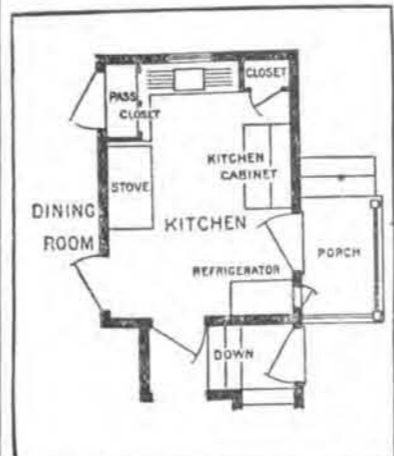

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture)

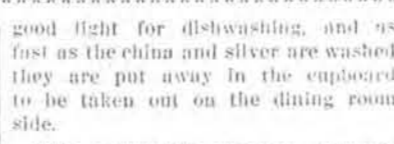
Here is a floor plan, sketched by the bureau of home economics, showing how a compact oblong kitchen may be arranged to best advantage.
