HOOVER BETRAYED FARMER, PEEK AVERS

Gives Proof That Candidate Was Responsible for Low Price of Wheat.

BORAH "EITHER IGNORANT OR GUILTY OF FRAUD"

CHICAGO—Senator Borah is either ignorant or Herbert Hoover's record or is "willfully guilty of fraud" in his campaign speeches to Western farmers. George N. Peek, noted farm leader and former chairman of the Industrial Conference Board of the Department of Commerce, has charged in a telegram to Dr. Hubert Work, chairman of the Republican National Committee.

Mr. Peek, who is active in behalf of Governor Smith because of the Governor's stand on the farm relief question, directly challenged the truth of Senator Borah's statements and the claims of the Republican campaign managers. He said:

"I realize that I am insisting upon a good deal when I demand fairness and facts from the Republican National Committee and its spokesmen, judging from the claims made in Mr. Hoover's behalf.

"Senator Borah in his address at Minneapolis raised a serious question of veracity as between himself and Mr. Hoover.

"Senator Borah asserts that Mr. Hoover held up the price of wheat. Moreover, a large part of the Republican campaign among the farmers is built on this claim. This is fraud.

"The records prove that if wheat had not been 'controlled' the price would have risen as did the prices of other cereal crops that were not controlled. It would have advanced as corn advanced and as oats advanced and would have sold for at least \$3.48 a bushel.

"I say that Mr. Hoover used every effort in his power to keep down prices and I submit in proof of this assertion Mr. Hoover's own words.

Held Prices Down

"Early in April, 1919, Mr. Hoover from Europe addressed a cablegram to me, from which I now quote.

"If the control of wheat were removed during the next two or three months in the face of the world situation, prices in this commodity would advance materially beyond the present level. I wish to repeat that unless some superior force intervenes, we intend to hold the price of wheat to the figures it has stood at during the entire war under Congressional guarantee."

"On May first, 1918, Mr. Hoover, then Food Administrator, in a public address declared:

"I agree with the contention of some farmers that they would be getting \$5 and perhaps \$10 a bushel for their wheat if it had not been for the restraint imposed by the government."

"I repeat that either Senator Borah and other Republican leaders are wholly ignorant of the 'record' which Senator Borah so persistently quotes or he or they are guilty of fraud.

"I insist that you and other Republican leaders inform Senator Borah, other speakers and the public whether the cable from Mr. Hoover in 1919 or the claims of Republican leaders now as presented in the campaign text book and in the public statements of Republican speakers are a fraud.

"Somebody is not telling the truth. The public will be interested in knowing who it is."

In a speech in New York City, on April 22, 1920, reviewing the work done by his Food Administration, Mr. Hoover said:

"The Grain Corporation was successfully managed by Mr. Barnes. In 1917 the wheat price was \$2.20 per bushel. The farmers could have obtained \$5 per bushel."

The quotation, from the Republican New York Tribune, proves conclusively that Hoover restricted the price of wheat, while other prices were permitted to go sky high.

Gov. Smith Convinces Big Business Men That Farm Prosperity Will Aid Industry

That Governor Smith, in his determined stand on behalf of agriculture, has already accomplished great things for the farmer becomes more apparent every day. Governor Smith is convincing the important business men of the East that prosperity of agriculture means as much to them as it does to the farmer himself. The indifference of the East to farm legislation is disappearing. For eight years the business interests of the East in general have accepted Herbert Hoover's belief that agriculture's gain would be in industry's loss.

Governor Smith has undertaken to show them how essential it is to increase the prosperity of the farmer and thus to increase the buying power of one-third of the national population for manufactured products.

Announcing his support for Governor Smith, Owen D. Young, Chairman of the General Electric Company said:

"On this farm problem, we must affirmatively move, because staying here will spell disaster. I believe in Governor Smith's capacity to lead the American people to action.

"I am supporting Governor Smith because I believe in his willingness and his capacity to put the farmer of this country on an equality with its industry. I am tired of hearing of farm relief as though the farmers of this country, as a class to whom all my people belong, are the kind of men who stand with their hats in their hands begging alms in the shape of Government doles.

"They ask for an equality of economic opportunity, and they are entitled to it. Not only must they be given it politically because it is right, but they must be given it from an economic standpoint if the prosperity of this country is to continue."

JOSEPH F. POMEROY CANDIDATE FOR STATE REPRESENTATIVE EIGHTH IN ARIZONA

Joseph F. Pomeroy, Republican candidate for State Representative, is an active son of Arizona. He has had a varied business career, which has carried him to all parts of the state, and has won for him a host of friends in every walk of life. Protestants Lead Smith Appointees

Conclusive proof that Governor Smith has never been controlled by political or religious influences is found in his appointments as Secretary of State Moses reveal that a great majority of the Governor's appointees are Protestants and that there are twice as many Republicans as Democrats in his Cabinet.

The Governor's Cabinet is comprised of 10 Protestants, 3 Catholics and 1 Jew. Of these 8 are Republican, 4 are Democrats and 2 are Independents.

Of 25 State Department heads, 14 are Protestants and 11 are Catholics. Eight are Republicans, 3 are Independents and 14 are Democrats.

Of 155 other State officials whose appointments require the approval of the Governor, there are 105 Protestants, 33 Catholics, 11 Jews and 7 undesignated.

In every case, regardless of all other considerations, Governor Smith appointed the person he thought best fitted for the office.

NEW YORK TICKET IMPRESSES NATION

Candidates Named by Governor Smith—Not One Affiliated With Tammany.

ROOSEVELT SUPPORTED BY REPUBLICAN PRESS

A distinctly favorable reaction to the nomination by the Democratic party of Franklin D. Roosevelt for Governor of New York State is perceived by political observers in almost every State of the Union.

Nobody in New York has any doubt that he will be elected. One of the most able and most highly respected figures in the history of American politics, he is said to be sure of the largest majority ever received by a candidate for Governor. His presence on the Democratic ticket, coupled with the fact that he is one of Governor Smith's closest friends, leaves the Hoover forces without hope in the Empire State.

But what is of greater significance, since no well-informed person has ever doubted the Governor's ability to carry his own State, is the reaction to Mr. Roosevelt's candidacy in the West and South. His consent to become the nominee, at Governor Smith's request, has made ridiculous the "Tammany cry" with which Republican campaign managers have attempted to influence voters in the districts unfamiliar with the Governor's record.

Tammany Not Represented

Mr. Roosevelt has never been affiliated with Tammany Hall, nor any other political machine. In fact, not a single candidate on the State ticket, which was in actuality named from top to bottom by Governor Smith, has any connection with Tammany.

New York Republican leaders acknowledge that, unlike their own candidate who is linked with the big power interests, Mr. Roosevelt is invulnerable to attack. A distinguished official of the Wilson Administration, in which he served as Assistant Secretary of the Navy, and the Democratic candidate for Vice President in 1920, he consistently refused to run for Governor until pressed to do so by Governor Smith.

One significant reaction to Governor Smith's choice of a man of such character and reputation to succeed him at Albany is the defection of two strong Hoover newspapers in New York, the Sun and the Telegram, both of which announced editorially that they would support the Democratic candidate for Governor.

To Preserve Smith Ideals

WARM SPRINGS, Ga.—Explaining why he had consented to be drafted by the party leaders of New York State, after his previous refusal to accept the nomination for Governor, Franklin D. Roosevelt said:

"It was because they felt and I felt that the whole splendid structure of government built up by Governor Smith and all the high ideals of service to the people which he had established were in peril that caused me to accept the nomination.

"That is something too important to let any personal considerations weigh in the slightest. I am in this fight not to win personal honor, but for the carrying forward of the policies of Governor Smith."

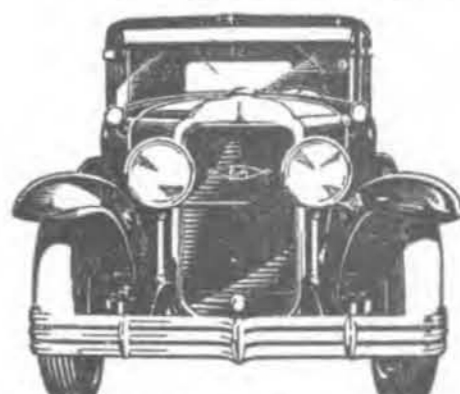

First stands the lofty Washington, That noble, great, immortal one. The elder Adams next we see, And Jefferson comes number three...

McKinley then, the well-beloved, A most efficient pilot proved. A crazed assassin laid him low— Again the nation voiced its woe.

Now Herbert Hoover of Belgian fame Adds to the list the thirtieth name. Or will it read something like this: And now the roll call here ends with Democracy's champion, Alfred Smith.

The answer will be written on November 6. But whichever it is, some new items will be added to the record of what may be called "Interesting Facts About Our Presidents."

If Hoover is elected President he will be The first bearing the name of Herbert. The first who was a native of Iowa. The first born west of the Mississippi. The first who was a citizen of California.

Presidency Hazardous

The President of the United States follows a hazardous occupation, according to statistics compiled by the Metropolitan Life Insurance company.

The first elected from the trans-Mississippi West. The first who was a Quaker in religion. The first secretary of commerce to be elevated to the Presidency.

The first mining engineer to occupy the White House.

If Smith is elected President he will be The first bearing the name of Alfred. The first who was a Catholic in religion. The first market man to become Chief Executive.

Although Hoover, if elected, will bring more "firsts," as shown above, Smith, if elected, will be a better example of "history repeating itself."

Should Smith be elected he will be the fourth President born in New York and elected from that state. Martin Van Buren, Millard Fillmore and Theodore Roosevelt being the other three.

If Smith is elected, it will place New York on almost an even basis with Virginia and Ohio as a training ground for Presidents.

Ohio's record is six native sons elected to the Presidency. They were Grant (who was elected from Illinois, however), Hayes, Garfield, McKinley, Taft and Harding.

Since the religious issue has been so prominent in the present campaign, it is interesting to note the variety of religions which have been represented in the White House.

Eight Presidents have been Episcopalians, seven Presbyterians, four Methodists, three Unitarians, two of the Reformed Dutch faith, one Baptist, one a member of the Disciples.

Thomas Jefferson was classed as a Liberal and a noted biographer declares that he was a believer in Christianity, although not a sectarian.

The Presidents who were Episcopalians were Washington, Madison, Monroe, Harrison, Tyler, Taylor, Pierce and Arthur. Those claimed as Presbyterians were Jackson, Polk, Buchanan, Lincoln, Cleveland, Harrison and Wilson.

Taft were Unitarians, Van Buren and Roosevelt were of the Reformed Dutch faith, Harding was a Baptist and Garfield a Disciple.

Seventeen of the Presidents were of English ancestry, six of Scotch-Irish, two were mostly Scotch and two of Dutch descent, one chiefly Welsh and another Scotch and Dutch.

Fifteen Presidents were sons of farmers and planters, four were sons of lawyers, three of merchants, three of clergymen, and one each of a doctor, a constable, a tanner and an iron maker.

Eight Presidents, as well as the present nominees, were born of families not blessed with worldly goods. Others were born in varied circumstances, mostly middle-class.

If fate should decree the election of Herbert Hoover, whose wealth is estimated at several million dollars, he will probably enter the White House as the richest President ever to assume office.

There have been twenty Presidents who went to college, some of them by their own efforts. Mr. Hoover is also a college man, but Governor Smith went through the "School of Experience."

Both of the candidates this year are a little over the average age of their predecessors on inauguration, which was fifty-four years and four months.

Three Presidents, Lincoln, Garfield and McKinley, have been assassinated. Jackson was fired at while in office, and Roosevelt was wounded by a crank, during the campaign in which he was a candidate for a third term.

Ten of the Presidents have been elected twice. They are Washington, Jefferson, Madison, Monroe, Jackson, Lincoln, Grant, Cleveland, McKinley and Wilson.

Four who served as President were never elected, being Vice Presidents who served out the terms of their Presidents who had died. They were Tyler, Fillmore, Johnson and Arthur.

All Presidents were married when elected, with the exception of Buchanan, Tyler, Fillmore, Benjamin Harrison, Roosevelt and Wilson married twice.

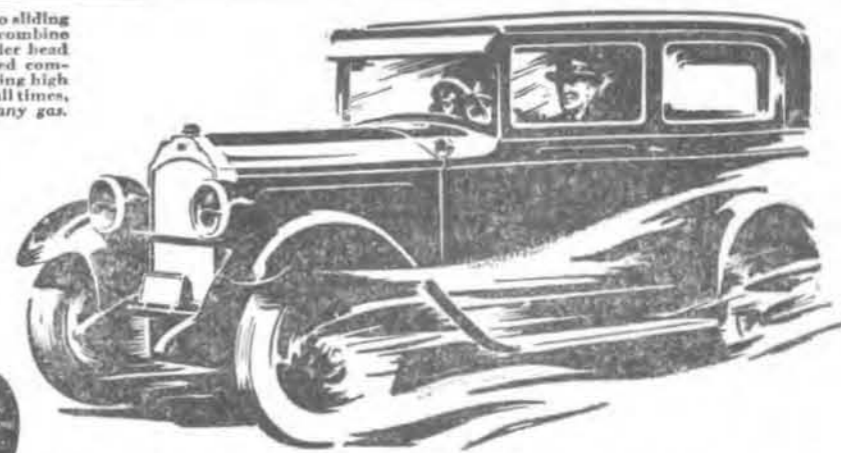

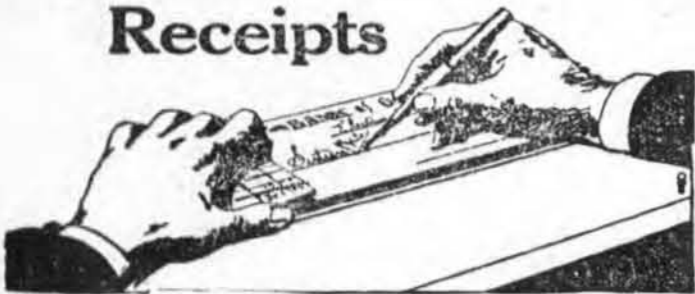

PLEA TO BIGOTRY A COSTLY BLUNDER

Hamilton Fish, Jr., Warns Hoover That Republican Success is Jeopardized.

WASHINGTON.—Hamilton Fish, Jr., Republican representative from New York, has warned Chairman Work of the Republican National Committee, that the injection of the religious issue into the campaign by accredited Republican speakers will result in a clean sweep of New York and the Eastern states by Governor Smith on that issue.

Calling on Mr. Hoover, Mr. Fish told the Republican presidential candidate that he was "so disgusted with such political blunders" as are being committed by the Hoover campaign managers that he contemplates abandoning his speaking tour in New York state.

The failure of the Republicans to nominate a single World War veteran... will be resented by the rank and file."

Mr. Fish advised that Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt and all others who are appealing to bigotry, be silenced "before irreparable harm has been done to the Republican ticket."

GOVERNOR OF NORTH CAROLINA ATTACKS BIGOTRY

RALEIGH, N. C.—A vigorous campaign for the election of Gov. Smith is being made throughout North Carolina by Governor A. W. McLean. Attacking religious intolerance, he said:

"I am ready to defend the right of Governor Smith and every other man or woman, whether Catholic or Protestant, to worship God in his own way."

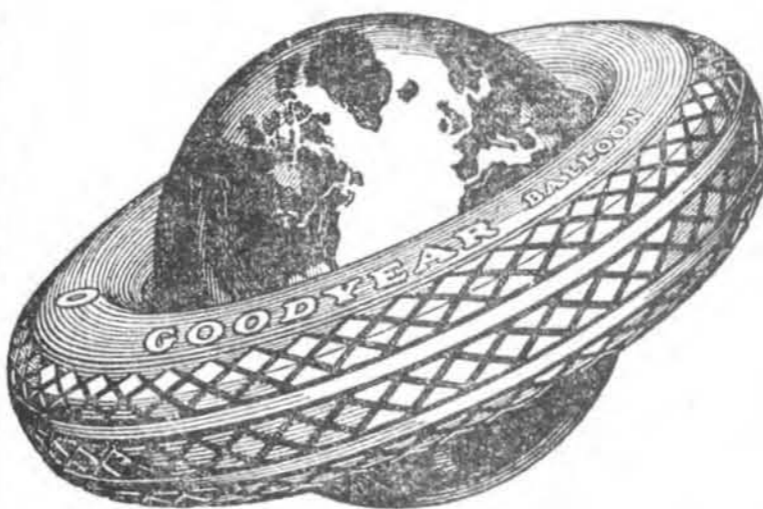

"EIGHT YEARS OF PROSPERITY"

Mr. Hoover maintains: That the last eight years have been the most glorious of history, since in these years American commerce has grown so fast. The last fiscal year of complete Democratic control, says J. H. Paul, Utah congressional candidate, ended with June, 1920. The exports for 1920 were \$8,228,016,000. Republican victory in November, 1920, caused exports to fall by July 1, 1921, to \$4,485,031,000. After Republicans took complete control, March 4, 1921, foreign exports declined to \$3,831,777,000 by July 1, 1922.

Slow gains followed, the exports to July 1, 1923, reaching \$4,968,000,000—an increase of only 10.7 per cent from July 1, 1920, eight years—less than 1.4 per cent a year. This is the real record of Republican increase, which is the smallest of any eight years in American history.

By beginning with 1922, after one year and four months of Republican control, Mr. Hoover is able to figure out an increase in exports of 41 per

cent in seven years, or 5.8 per cent a year. But even so, the per cent of increase is perhaps the smallest we have ever had. In the five years preceding the war, 1908 to 1913, the rate of increase was 6.5 per cent a year, and in the five years prior to 1908 the increase was over 7 per cent a year.

Why the small rate of growth since 1920 so greatly impresses Mr. Hoover is indeed a puzzle. The Statistical Abstract, issued by his department, proves exactly the opposite of his claim.

2. He claims that prices have not risen under the high tariff. This is true of farm products; but all other prices have risen. The gain to the protected industries of the east, four billions per year, is two-thirds the fall in farm values, twenty-one billions, in these eight years. The rest of the loss eleven billion dollars, fell upon the 90 per cent of our population that the tariff cannot protect.

MRS. ANNA B. ACKLEY CALLED TO COLORADO BY DEATH OF HER ONLY SISTER

Nogales, Ariz., Oct. 26.—Mrs. Anna B. Many residents of Santa Cruz county will remember Miss Brooks, as she visited Mrs. Ackley in Nogales in 1921, remaining here for about two years. Shortly after returning to her Colorado home in 1925 she was taken seriously sick and had been an invalid constantly since that time. Mrs. Ackley and her sister were the only remaining members of a pioneer Colorado family.

Mrs. Ackley has the sympathy of a host of friends in Santa Cruz county over her great loss.

OLD BANK FAILURE STARTED GRAY TO SPECULATE

Tucson, Oct. 25.—The collapse of the Tucson National bank in the spring of 1923 and the consequent loss of \$14,000 of his own money started George Gray, defaulting city treasurer, on the career of secret speculation that resulted in his arrest and confession to more than \$300,000 of embezzlements October 13.

This was the purport of a long detailed statement made by Gray at a public hearing Wednesday and released for publication yesterday morning by Ben Hill, city attorney.

Tucson, Oct. 23.—Funeral services for George McCarty, 68, of Canille Ariz., who died in a local hospital Tuesday afternoon, will be conducted by the All Saints' church at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning.

Deceased left two sisters, Mrs. Mary F. Sutton of Hartford, Kan., and Mrs. M. A. Igo of Tucson, and two brothers, John and Pat McCarty of Canille, Arizona, to mourn his loss. He came to Arizona in 1882 to live on a ranch in the Canille Hills. He was a well-known pioneer of Santa Cruz county. Burial was in Holy Hope cemetery.
