## C. & A. and NEW CORNELIA

Phoenix, Ariz., May 5.—One of the largest mining mergers in the history of Arizona was consummated when the Calumet and Arizona Mining Co. and the New Cornelia Copper Company filed final papers with the Arizona corporation commission. The new company will be known as the Calumet and Arizona Mining Co.

Under the merger the new mining company has a capital stock of \$20,000,000. The old Calumet and Arizona company's capital stock was \$6,500,000. The New Cornelia's \$9,000,000, while the new merger company will have \$1,000,000 more than the combined stock of the two. Total resources of the new company as listed by the two mining concerns involved in the new merger on Dec. 31, 1928 in cash and bonds, etc., was given as \$15,812,228. This does not include value of properties of anticipated ore.

Liabilities of the companies are listed as none, with the exception of operating the properties of the two concerns in Lordsburg, N. M.; Bisbee, Ajo, Jerome and various other points in Arizona.

Under the merger agreement the officers of the Calumet and Arizona Mining company will hold the new concern.

## War News

Headed by Gen. Juan Andruan Almazan, riding a spirited bay horse, an army of more than 9,000 men rode into Agua Prieta Thursday from the east. This is the federal army which came through the Sierra Madre mountains which the rebels had attempted to hold by guarding the Puerto pass and other crevices in the tall hills.

Gen. Almazan was greeted by Gen. Ygnacio Flores, the federal officer who surrendered Juriz, Chihuahua, to the rebels during the early part of the revolt and who later came to Naco with his army. His last act in the drama, to date was taking of Agua Prieta for the federalists single handed at dawn Wednesday.

The troops of Gen. Almazan began to arrive at the eastern gates of Agua Prieta at 11 a. m. With bugles blowing the regiments marched into town and paraded through the streets riding jaded horses, loaded with rifles, ammunition and equipment. Following the cavalry there were some 50 big new trucks loaded with foot soldiers and supplies.

Troops continued to arrive throughout the afternoon at intervals and when night fell it was reported that additional troops were still on the road, so there would be additional arrivals far into the night. Calculation led observers to state that there was little doubt but that Gen. Almazan at the present moment is a strong figure in Mexico for under present conditions it is conceded that the man commanding the largest and best equipped army is the strongest.

With the 9,000 troops which Almazan brought with him, the 1,500 rebels who were signed over to his command before he arrived and the federal garrison at Naco, probably containing at least a 1,000 men, the armed strength of the federal commander in the Agua Prieta district is imposing.

## Governor Invites To Dedication

**Distinguished Visitor Here**

Phoenix, May 8.—An invitation to the people of Arizona and of the Great Southwest to attend the dedication of the famous Grand Canyon highway bridge near Lee's Ferry on June 14 has been issued by Governor John C. Phillips in an official statement calling attention to the bridge's importance in tourist development.

The dedication will be made the occasion for a great All-Southwest celebration to be directed by the Arizona Industrial Congress and Arizona Chambers of Commerce, and plans for it include a number of petrosaurus entertainment features. The Governor's invitation reads as follows:

**TO THE PEOPLE OF ARIZONA AND OF THE GREAT SOUTHWEST:**

"On June 14th and 15th, in company with other states of the Southwest we will celebrate the completion of the Grand Canyon bridge over the Colorado river in the vicinity of Lee's Ferry.

This bridge is a wonderful engineering achievement, and makes another triumph of man over nature. The structure is 884 feet in length, and stands 467 feet above the waters of the river making it the highest highway bridge in the world. The cost is approximately \$350,000.

"I have invited the Governors of California, Colorado, Utah, Nevada and New Mexico to be our guests on this occasion, and to rejoice with us in the completion of the bridge which will make us closer neighbors and friends.

Lieutenant Ogden is associated with L. Lindsay in the manufacture of a trans-motored plane with headquarters in Los Angeles, and his visit to this district was to inspect the Molly Gibson property to ascertain the possibilities of laying out a landing field to be used by the officers of the Arizona Consolidated Copper Company in the near future. Mr. Ogden is also interested in the mining company and expressed himself well pleased with the country in general and the Molly Gibson property in particular.

Mrs. Ogden, who is a licensed florist, and the daughter of Mr. George J. Snook, Treasurer of the Arizona Consolidated Copper Company, accompanied her husband on the trip.

## CIGARETTE BIG FIRE HAZARD

Every time a careless smoker throws a burning cigarette into the dry grass or needles of the forest floor he is giving the fire demon odds of 1 to 9 that it won't start a fire, says the United States Forest Service. These odds, coupled with the fact that there is smoked and discarded in the United States the amazing total of 171,232 cigarettes per minute, day and night, during the entire year, are believed to account for the large percentage of man caused forest and brush fires that are started by smokers. Even if only one-third of the cigarettes consumed throughout the country there would still be over 50,000 chances a minute of a fire starting from a burning snipe, foresters point out.

There are 200,000 known kinds of tree attacking insects. It is estimated that these cause a loss of one hundred millions of dollars every year.

Let's whoop her up for the big Rodeo to be held at the Circle z Ranch July 4th.

Now that spring is here a number of people in this vicinity are afflicted with Newcaritis not harmful, but hard on Dad's pocketbook.

Do you know that Pecons can be successfully grown in Sonoita Valley? Well, they can, for Postmaster Riggs has grown them on his place and has about a dozen Pecon trees.

Why does capital go chasing round the world looking for good mining prospects, when we have here in Patagonia district, one of the most highly mineralized districts for its size in the world? We invite investigation.

A state agent for a large insurance company, doing business in Patagonia, told us this week that his company's fire loss in Patagonia last year was very low. Welcome tribute to our local fire-fighting boys. We might use that as an argument to have the insurance rates in Patagonia reduced.

Hoover can promise relief until doomsday, Congress can bellyache until the end of time, and the people may laud these wizards of politics, but until the finance of this Nation is changed the poor will grow poorer and the rich will grow richer.

So says a letter from Charles E. Bagget, which Hon. W. W. Larsh of Georgia has read into the congressional record.

"Reach for a pint instead of a sweet" is the bold slogan of the bootleggers, and which the candy manufacturers claim has hurt their business to the tune of a 25 percent reduction since prohibition.

## New Arizona Game Code

Following is a summary of the new game law as passed by the legislature and signed by Governor Phillips, as prepared for the Cocomino Sun by T. E. McCullough of Flagstaff, former president of the state association and one of the men who was active in helping frame the new code:

The license fee has been raised from \$1.25 to \$2.50 for the general hunting and fishing license. If fishing alone is desired, a special fishing license fee of \$1.25 will be charged. In order to take care of non-resident tourists—of particular interest in this section of the state—a special 15-day fishing license with a charge of \$2.50 has been provided.

Non-resident general hunting and fishing license has been raised from \$25 to \$35. Another license providing for a non-resident to fish and hunt small game calls for a fee of \$10.

Allens will find it expensive to hunt and fish in Arizona with a general hunting and fishing license fee of \$75. To encourage allens to become citizens, it is provided that when they take out their first papers the general hunting and fishing license will cost only \$25 but only two of these licenses will be issued to an alien during the pendency of his application for citizenship. Provision is also made for an applicant alien to secure a fishing and small game license for \$10 in contrast to \$30, if he has not yet made application for citizenship.

The most interesting part of the new game code is covered by the commission form of operation. Three commissioners will be appointed by the governor within 30 days from his signing of the bill, one for two years, one for four years and the third member for six years. Each succeeding governor will appoint one commissioner for a period of six years. The commission will have the authority to appoint the state game warden and pass on the appointment of the deputy game wardens. This plan will remove this department from politics and it is hoped will result in building up a non-political, efficient and functioning warden force.

This commission will have the authority to create game refuges and to change the boundaries of the refuges they create where experience shows they are not logically bounded. Through this valuable power, it will be required to make each refuge a matter of legislative action, possible only every two years. This will prove a big benefit to Cocomino county particularly.

The season on deer and turkey has been changed from the month of October to a 30-day period starting October 16 to November 15, inclusive, with the same bag limits as at present. A deer, however, must have pronghorns, which is a change from the old law stipulating a spike.

Tree squirrels are protected except during the big game open season with a daily bag-limit of six. Wild elk, antelope and mountain sheep are protected, as are also beaver. The limit on quail evoked a fight in the legislature when Mr. Weisner, Yuma, attempted to cut the code's provisions from 20 down to 10 birds in a day. The commission can reduce this limit if any county so desires and shows a majority of interested hunters in favor of the lower limits. Ducks have been reduced as to bag limits from 20 to 15 in any one day or possession.

Bear are protected except during the big game season, with a limit of one bear in the season. Road-runners can now be killed, as the protection has been taken off of them.

The salary of the state game warden has been fixed at \$3,600 a year, with a travel and expense allowance of not to exceed \$1,200 in a year. An improvement has been made, also, in the salary of the deputy wardens, whose salary will be based on length of service. The first two years, the salary will be \$180 a month with \$50 a month maximum expense for travel allowed. The third and fourth year the salary will be \$200 a month, fifth and sixth year \$220 a month, with a \$50 a month expense for travel, allowed as a maximum. After six years, the deputy's salary will be \$250 a month with \$50 a month for expenses. This schedule will enable a man to have a definite goal in mind in event he makes good on this work, and by continuing in the service he can make it a profession with a living wage.

The entire code is logical, complete and satisfactory, a step forward for Arizona. Entire credit for this is given to the Arizona Game Protective association whose efforts for the past six years have been directed toward new game and fish

laws in order to bring Arizona up-to-date. It is felt that better constructive work can now be accomplished with the one idea in mind—"Better hunting and better fishing for Arizona."

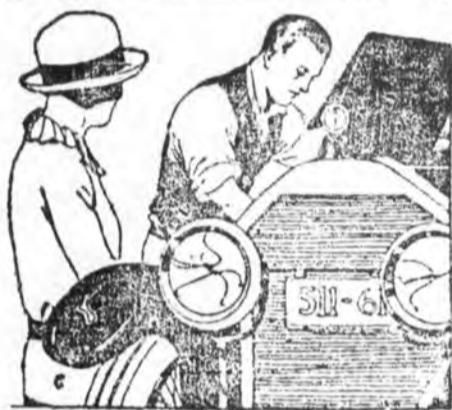

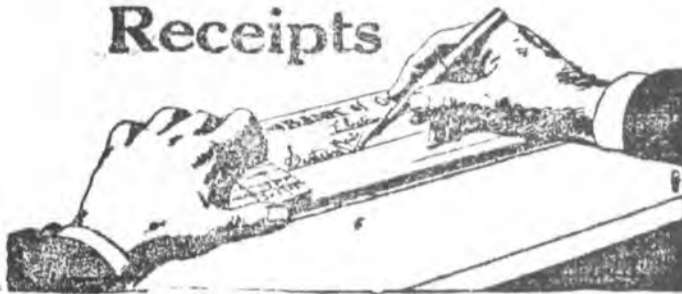

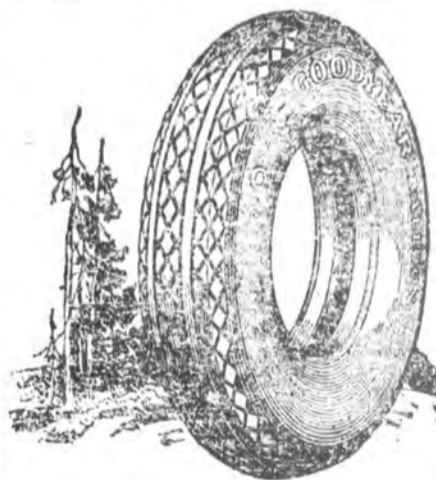
